
Instructions. Look at the following pictures of artifacts and read the descriptions. Use your research tools to answer the questions.

1. Carriage. A carriage was how some people traveled from place to place. It needed at least one horse to pull it. Most farm families had a horse, but not everyone had a carriage.

What are two ways life would be different for women and girls who dressed like this?

- 4. Privy/Outhouse. This was the bathroom for the Dinsmore family. This privy or outhouse was outside, about 20 yards from the main house. It did not include a toilet that flushed, a sink, a shower, or a bathtub. Their bathtub was inside the house and was only used one time each week, Saturday nights. To fill the bathtub it took about 20 trips to the water well; so everyone in the family used the same water.
