January

- 1 Foggy but cleared. Sent letter to Amy and picture cards to Susie T. Miss Artie and Louly H, Sally and I went to a tea at Mrs. John Amery Jeffries on the beach. Ocean high tide and grand and pleasant drive.
- 2 Bright pretty day—went down town with ___ Sally and to see Frank's office. Got from Polly book memorial of Lawson. Card from Clara Hill. Mrs. Whitehead came and read me two poems—about eucalyptus tree and on the subject of age—both fine. Mr. W. was with her.
- 3 Another lovely day. Sally and Frank went to lunch with Mrs. Fithian. I sent verses to Mrs. Whitehead. Went after Sally for the drive. Got a telegram from Polly about book sent her one.
- 9 Friday. Got up and bathed and dressed and went to lunch but felt shakling [sic]. Got letter from Julia. Sunday I woke feeling queer and found I had caught the prevailing form of grippe. Sally sent for Dr. Williams who came and prescribed for me. Monday night they were going to a concert and Sally got Miss Petersen to come and stay with me—she went home Wednesday night. Mrs. Whitehead sent me a note about my piece I sent her. I got letter from Mrs. Robinson written on the steamer and one from Fanny. Got an Ajo paper from John G. about their home. Dr. Williams came and said I must go back to bed as I had some temperature left.
- 10 Saturday—had to stay in bed, bright pretty day. Got letter from Susan—she said Frances Grant had dislocated her arm. Got checks from banks.

Sally had Miss Petie up again and I had to stay in bed &c.
- 11 Sunday. Got up for part of the day and felt much better, thank Heaven. Sally and Frank went to movie. I think a letter came from Fanny.
- 12 Cold they said—very bright. Got paper from Natl. Bk. of Wash., letter from Fanny—from Beulah, and poem from Mr. Ralph Whitehead. I was up most of the day. Dr. W. did n't come. Miss Marin called.
- 13 Sent letter to Lily. At night Miss Petey went home. Began taking tonic—up most of the day. Frank gave me a receipt for some checks of Patty's estate. Frank and Sally went down to see Bobby. Cool day.
- 14 Rained a little and very windy. Gave Sally my 6 checks signed to deposit and bring me some money (see 10th). Sally brought me 24.75 cash and deposited the balance 234.50. Showers off and on Sally said that there was a sudden storm with rain and a perfectly beautiful double rainbow.
- 15 Clear and colder. Went with Sally in the motor downtown for the first time since Sat. 3 when I caught the grippe. Got a little note from Isabella. Sally and I read over my will. Mrs. Oliver came to see me.
- 16 Clear and cold they say. Got up and came out to breakfast as usual the first time since my grippe. Stayed in the house all day.
- 17 Clear and not so cold—went down town with Sally. Got letters from Lily and Lizzie H. Sent letter to Susan.
- 18 Sunday. Bright and not so cold. Bobby and Peter Folger came to lunch. Sent letter to Lily and note to Beulah with 6.00. Sally and I went to a concert at Cate's school.

- 19 Beautiful day—so much warmer it feels like summer. Went with Sally for the drive. Miss Baridon has gone to San F. I got letter from Amy. I sent letter to Susie T. with 5.00. Frank went to San Francisco on the night train.
- 20 Beautiful day—warmer—saw a glimpse of a lizard and a road-runner bird. Went down town with Sally. Sent Susie T. letter with 5.00, got one from Lucy H. After lunch went to a beautiful beach (Mr. Marwick's) saw birds. Sally saw a pelican.
- 21 Frank came back from San Francisco. Got letter from Mary Selmes. Sophie had to leave and go to Los Angeles because of the death of her sister's son. We went to Mrs. Oliver's.
- 22 Misty and mild. Sally went to a lunch at Mrs. Thorne's. I went after her for the drive.
- 23 I don't know why I did n't write. Sent a letter to Lucy J. Went in the motor with Sally.
- 24 Bright—but cloudy sunset. Went to matinée with Sally and F. to the Lovers Theatre to see Lillian by the amateurs. Sent letter to Julia F. Eclipse of sun.
- 25 Sunday. Heavy fog and misting rain, afterwards it rained steadily most of the day. We all stayed home. Cold rain.
- 26 Beautiful day after the rain. Went twice with Sally, in the motor. Mr. Bliss lunched here. Frank gave me a letter he had from Judge N. E. Riddell about my being Administratrix [of] Patty[s] estate and also a letter from him releasing me from all consequences for his taking care of the estate as Trustee. Judge Riddell's letter is dated Jan. 20th. Sophie came back. Met Mrs. Hill the sister of Miss Petersen.
- 27 Pretty day. Went down town with Sally before lunch. After she went to see Miss Ryan for Isabella. Sophie took to mail for me letter to Sally Mallory.
- 28 Bright lovely day. Went down town with Sally. Lawrence came and they had a housecleaning. The papers tell about bad cold and snow. Mrs. Lily Draper, Mrs. Hodge and Miss Parry called.
- 29 Strange fogs, early and came up late like a wet blanket. I went down town before lunch and after went to a picture exhibit. Sent letter to Susan. Miss Lawson called while we were gone. Last night and to-night the frogs 'hollered.' The papers tell of cold and snow unusual.
- 30 Heavy fog over all the view—very damp all day. I did n't go anywhere. Sally and Frank lunched with Mrs. Chatfield Taylor. Sally had letter from Martha.
- 31 Not so foggy—chilly. Went calling with Sally—no one at home. Sent letter to Sally Chenault. Bobby came for a little while—on his way after his car. We stopped at Mrs. Oliver's—she and Mr. John Alsop came. Later Mr. and Mrs. Bissell came.

February

- 1 Sunday, bright day, rather cooler. Bobby and Virginia and Peter Folger came to lunch. Then we went to the Polo game between Santa Barbara and Riverside. I saw the first covey of quails this year. Mrs. Pritchett and Mr. called while we were at polo.
- 2 Heavy fog, chilly. Went with Sally to Miss Baridon's. Got letter from Beulah of Jan. 28 said there was a big snow the night before. Got a little note from Susie with a copy of an old newspaper clipping about the death of Grandpa Bell at 96. Sent letter to Julia Loving 5.00. Cleared off. We all went to the orchestral Concert at the Grenada Theatre. Fog late. The Philharmonic Concert.
- 3 Dense fog right up to the house cleared off. Sally went to El Mirasol to a lunch given to Lily D. by Mrs. Hodge and Miss Parry. Mrs. and Miss Petersen came to see us. I got letters from Lily G. and Susan and a notice of lecture for Bird Museum and bill for tonic!
- 4 Heavy fog that afterwards lifted. Sally went shopping. I got her to take the money and pay for the tonic. Sally went to lunch at Mrs. Jefferson's. I went down for the drive. Sent Isabella 2 washrags. Yesterday Mrs. fithian came and stayed to supper and Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell called—I did n't put down.

- 5 Heavy fog. I sent Mrs. Buriss a check for 12.—on Cit. Dep. Bk. Also one for 5.00 on the same to Harry in letter to Susan—not charged to Harry.
- 6 Looked a little like rain and sprinkled—cleared off and later was windy. Went down town with Sally, got a letter from Julia. Went with Sally to the Country Club to see the exhibit of pictures—then went to get Frank from riding and he took us down to the polo game.
- 7 Clear, rain clouds passed away. Went with Sally down town before lunch. Got letter from Susie T. Got check of Feb. 2nd from Am. Gas and Electric Co. 37.50 and from Am. Light and Traction Co. 30.00.
- 8 Sunday. Heavy fog and drizzling rain. Duncan Draper and Mrs. Fithian lunched here. Sally and Frank went to the Polo field but the rain stopped game. I stayed home—drizzle cold and fog heavy. Found a note and book from Mrs. Bissel.
- 9 Bright and prospect of rain gone. Got a letter from Julia Loving. Bobby came up for a little while. Mr. and Mrs. Cameron Quires called.
- 10 Lovely morning—heard field lark ding. Sent letter to Lily G. Went with Sally to the Club after Frank. We went to the concert of Albert Spalding violinist. Lovely concert.
- 11 Bright morning. Sent letter to Fanny Gibbon and later sent letters to Laura D. and to Beulah with 2.00. Went down town with Sally—she and I dined at Mrs. Thomes. It rained—a real rain during the night. Went to the Samarcand Hotel with Sally on our drive.
- 12 Rained this morning early and off and on during the day and very heavy fog. Cleared off later and I went with Sally to see C. C. Cooper painting landscapes.
- 13 Bright and cool. Went to the polo game and then to Mrs. Fithian's.
- 14 Did n't write in this. Bobby came up between games and stayed all night.
- 15 Sunday. Went to the polo game. Bobby with us. Went from there to Mrs. Hoffman's tea for Mrs. Dwyer Bridge (Ditty) and saw her and Everett. It looked as if it would pour down at the game and later but did not rain at all.
- 16 Went down town with Sally and to Country Club after Frank. Got wrapper from Miss Bardon's. Met Miss Pierce. Gave Sally my two checks endorsed, see 7th. She deposited the 37.50 in County Natl. Bk. and brought me the cash 30. for the other. Mrs. Hodenpyl came to see us. We went to see an exhibition of satin quilts and blankets and robes made at Hardinsburg Ky. Mrs. Bacon came to call and read us a book The Little Mixer. Bright and pleasant. Heard field lark.
- 17 Bright beautiful day—heard field larks and saw a quail of a covey in the yard bushes. Sally had a lunch party. Mrs. Honeymean 'et al.' Afterwards we went to call on Mrs. Bissell—did n't see her—then went to Mrs. Oliver's. Frank heard that Dave Goodrich was in town. Sally called him up at El Mirasol.
- 18 Cool. Went with Sally before lunch. Miss Ryan came to see us. Also Mrs. Collins called on Sally. We all went as guests of Mrs. David Gray to Lovers Theatre to hear the concert of Roland Hayes colored tenor—a native of Georgia—he has a beautiful voice—sang in Italian French and German—as well as negro melodies. A full audience and very enthusiastic. It sprinkled about the time we came home and later rained.
- 19 Heavy fog. Sent letter to Fanny G. Went with Sally to dine and to see pictures. Got a letter from Susan with a bill from Lewis L. Stephens for 104 bus. coal at 29 cts. a bus. the bill says total 29.82.
- 20 Horrid day. Sophie says it rained a little last night. Wet blanket fog and drizzle. Wrote to Susan inclosing check for 25.00 on Cit. Dep. Bk. for Harry—and sent one to Lewis L. Stepheasn for 29.82 on Boone Co. Dep. Bk. It rained off and on all day nearly. Sally and Frank dined at Mr. Cates. Cleared.
- 21 Bright and windy and cool. Frank put in P.O. my letters of yesterday. Dave Goodrich came to see us. Later we went to Samarcand and to see Miss Peterson. Got postcard from Lucy at Miami.
- 22 Sunday. Cloudy and cool. Sally got call from Willie Rucker at El Mirasol. We went to Concert. Mr. and Mrs. Shepherd came to tea.

- 23 Rained last night and raining still, like a drizzle at times. I stayed home. Sally and Frank went to see Willie and Sally Rucker. Cleared.
- 24 Clear and pleasant—went down town with Sally. Sally and Willie R. came to lunch. Sally and I went to call on Mrs. Bissell and leave her book.
- 25 Lovely spring day. Mrs. Fithian lunched with us. We went to the polo. Sally read in the N. Y. Times of the marriage of Ruth Flandrau (Mrs. Sutton[]). She was married at Julia's 215 Madison Ave. to Mr. James P. Olney of Rome N. Y. by Rev. Thomas McCandless of St. Michael's. I got Lex. paper with notice of Mr. Chenault's critical condition. Ash Wednesday
- 26 Lovely spring day. Sent letter to Julia after lunch sent letters to Isabella & Julia Ethridge. Went with Sally and Frank to Cate's school and up the mesa to see Bobby and the Cates house. Met Mrs. Cate.
- 27 Summer day. Sent letter to Lizzie H. and later sent Mrs. Burris a check for 12.00 on Cit. Dep. Bk. We all went to polo. I saw a lizard basking on a rock to-day—it is so much warmer. Birds sing.
- 28 Another summer day. Went down town and to Bank and after lunch with Sally to a matinée of the Hottentot and called at Mrs. Olivers—not at home. Frank went to theatre too.

March

- 1 60° at 7 A.M. Heavenly day. Sunday. Mr. Erskine Wood came to call. Heard field larks and saw quails running on the grounds. Bobby and Peter Folger and Gordon McIntosh came to lunch. Dave Goodrich called up and came to lunch—said he was going away early to-morrow. John Greenway called up long distance and said Isabella is sick in bed. Dave told us goodbye. The rest of us went on to the Polo—the boys are to go from there. It is just like summer. Sally and F. went to hear Cap. V. Gilbert.
- 2 Bright day. John telegraphed Isabella is better. Sent letter to Susie T. Went down town. Sent note to Sally Chenault. Mrs. Oliver came to call.
- 3 Bright lovely day. Went down town with Sally. Later we all went to lunch with Willie and Sally Rucker at El Mirasol. Mr. Nanny Honeyman came to tell Sally goodbye. We got a long letter from Belle B. who has gone to Cuba.
- 4 The day Coolidge and Dawes are to be inaugurated. Sent notes to Isabella and Lucy J. Heavy fog, cleared later. Frank heard from Dave G. about Isabella and from John. I got a letter from Fanny G. Sally went to a lunch of Lily Duncan Draper. We all went to the Museum of Nat. History to hear Mr. Lungren talk about Indian pottery, Hopi snake dance &c. It turned colder and damp and fog came up. We stopped to call on Miss Marin—did n't see her.
- 5 Bad day heavy fog and very damp. I stayed home all day. Sally went to a large lunch given by Mrs. Wilcox at El Mirasol. Frank had telegrams from John telling him to come to Isabella and bring Dr. Koefod and he made arrangements for to-morrow. He also heard that Martha is sick. I sent note to her.
- 6 I forgot it was my birthday till Sally wished me luck—it is Frank's too—he is 61 and I am 92 having been born in 1833. Thank God it is no worse. Foggy but the sun is trying to come out. Mrs. Fithian came early and brought us a big basket of heavenly flowers. About noon it began to rain at 12.15 Frank started in the motor for Los Angeles to take Dr. Koefod to Ajo. Mattheson telephoned from Los Angeles that they got the train. It was a very cold rain and they said there was snow on the mountain but the mist hid it from me. Mrs. Pritchett came to see me and brought me beautiful flowers from herself and from Mrs. Bacon with birthday card. There was a beautiful rainbow. Mattheson got back.
- 7 Clear and cold. I saw the skim of snow on the mountains. Frank called up long distance about Isabella. Sally called up Bobby. I got a letter from Flora for my birthday. Also one from Susan. Cleo had a girl-baby Feb. 26th named Mary Louise. Cleo is at home with Susan. My cow Blanche had died. Frank telephoned he would stay at Ajo till Monday. Took a drive with Sally down to Mrs. Fithians.

- 8 Sunday, cold and windy. Sally had telephones from Frank about Isabella. Dr. Koefod came to bring her a letter from Frank and to tell her. All day telegraphs and telephones—from Bobby and others and last from Frank rather better news. Sally and Willie Rucker called. I sent letter to Flora.
- 9 Cold and very windy and unpleasant. We went down town before lunch. Frank telegraphed that Isabella was better. Sally spent much time at the telephone. At sundown we saw a sun dog. I had not seen one since Minnesota. I got a present from Fanny G. a scarf.
- 10 Cold and windy but milder than yesterday. Sally and I went to Mrs. Petersen's and down town. Mrs. Oliver and Mrs. Alsop came later. Frank telephoned and telegraphed that Isabella is better.
- 11 Cold and very windy—more so at night. Went with Sally down town. Got letter from Julia Ethridge about Ruth's marriage to Mr. Olney—letter of Marc 5th. Sally had letter and telegram about Isabella—better and she had [heard] from Bobby. Wind blew hard all night.
- 12 Bright and pleasanter than it has been for days. I went down with Sally before lunch. Sent a letter to Susan. During the day Sally got messages from Frank about Isabella. Later one from Isabella about getting things for Bobby[s] birthday to-morrow. Sally went and got the basket of things and took them to Bobby at Cate's school. Sally got a letter from Miss Mary Selmes.
- 13 Bobby's birthday, he is seventeen a handsome boy and sweet natured I believe. Frank telegraphed that Isabella was seeming better—Martha too. Got a card from Lily. Sent letters to Fanny G. and to Julia Ethridge. Frank telegraphed Sally that he expected to come home to-morrow. Drove to Mrs. Fithians. Dorothy sick. Called on Lily Duncan and Sally Rucker—no one at home. Later Mrs. Whitelaw called on Sally and me. I saw her. Her first husband was Cousin Maria Fox's son Charlie. Sally and I went to the concert of the Roman Choir. The day was mild and spring-like. We saw Bobby at the concert.
- 14 Bright and mild. Frank telephoned from Los Angeles for Mattheson to come after him. He did go down for him and he came about 3.30 P.M. I got a letter from Amy at Chandler, Arizona. Frank left Isabella better. Stayed home.
- 15 Sunday. Perfectly lovely spring day. Sent letters to Isabella and to Amy Campbell, and later by Sophie one to Miss Mary Selmes. Gen. Greenway called up and said Isabella was still better. Sally and Frank went to dine at the Club with the Cameron Squires and something that he ate made Frank sick and Sally called up Dr. Williams who came and treated him, till he was better. Sally and Frank went to see Bobby in the afternoon.
- 16 Dr. Williams came to see Frank—he is better. A lovely summer day. Sent Beulah a letter with 1.00. Got postal from Lucy and letter from Amy C. and picture postal from Miss Merrill. I sent letter with clipping to Gen Greenway. Mrs. Oliver posted it. Mrs. Oliver came to tea. Miss Ruth Draper and her friend Miss . Later Mr. and Mrs. Reinold Noyes of St. Paul came to dine and went with Sally and me to see Miss Ruth Draper's monologues at Porter Theatre. Warm pleasant night. Frank in bed but much better.
- 17 Beautiful spring day. Frank up and out again. Good news about Isabella from John. I went down town with Sally—she telegraphed Amy at Pasadena and got telephone from Amy.
- 18 Summer day. Went with Sally and Mrs. Oliver to a lunch given by Mrs. Hooper at the H. Adobe—there were a dozen or more ladies there some I don't know who. John telegraphed Isabella still better.
- 19 Summer day. Went twice with Sally. Got letter from Lizzie H. Saw lizards out on rocks. Papers told about tornado.
- 20 Another summer day. Went down town with Sally in Bobby's car—got a letter from Martha of the 14th. Sent letter to Lily. Sally sent a box of flower and garden seeds home to be planted. Cut a piece out of the L. A. paper about the tobacco pool checks paid. Bobby and Umpson came. Bobby got his car. Went to drive with Sally to Channel Drive.

- 21 Fog last night and this morning. Sent letter to Lucy. Sally brought me 20. Of my money she put into the County Natl. Bk. They got a telegram from John in consequence of which they are going to Ajo to-morrow instead of Monday. Sent letter to Beulah with 1.00. Bobby started for Ajo with Peter and Umpton at night. We all went to hear Kreisler—beautiful concert.
- 22 Sunday. Isabella's birthday 39. Frank sent her telegram. Foggy but clearing. At 11.30 Sally and Frank started in the car for Los Angeles on the way to Ajo to see Isabella. I sent a note to Judge N. E. Riddell enclosing check for 10.00 on Boone Co. Dep. Bk. for the Red Cross. Willie and Sally Rucker came to tell me good-bye. Then Mr. and Mrs. Reinold Noyes came not knowing Sally was gone. Then Miss Pierie came to stay with me while Sally is gone. Pleasant day. Sally and Frank went to Los Angeles in their car.
- 23 Very foggy. Got telegram from Sally. Isabella stronger and better. Got letter from Flave Loudon saying he was going to move! Also note from Cleo. I sent letter to Flave and to Harry. After lunch Miss Pierie and I went in the car down town—to get the telegram and then took a long motor trip and to Las Alturas. At 8 P.M. it thundered and rained for a few minutes.
- 24 Bright again lovely day. We went to Feather Hill. Mr. C. R. Holmes' ranch where he has his private zoo—and down miles on the way back. Sent a letter to-day to Martha—got one from Julia Jarrell.
- 25 Beautiful bright day. Sent letter to Julia Jarrell by Mattheson, and one to Lizzie H. Got letter from John Greenway. After lunch we took a drive got telegram from Sally—all well I. better. We went to Hope Ranch, Goleta & round back home. The windows and doors shook and rattled with the target firing of the war ships at sea.
- 26 Rained, foggy early and most of the day a cold rain not hard. We stayed home. Mr. Billy Peet called up—wanted to see Frank. Sent letter to Susie Tew. Rained a little at night.
- 27 Very foggy—sometimes drizzled and very chilly. Got telegram from Sally—Isabella better—they expect to come home Sunday. We did n't drive out.
- 28 Pleasanter but not right clear though the sun was out part of the day. Before lunch we took a drive in a circle starting up Las Lunas road. I got letter from Sally with pictures of the baby and one from Lucy J. and Fanny Gibbon. Mrs. Fithian came this afternoon.
- 29 Began to rain slightly before we went to Bed. Sunday. It poured all night and this morning off and on, when it quit raining the wind blew hard and it is chilly. Frank telephoned from Los Angeles that they missed the train and would not be here till this evening. Miss Pierie went home. Frank and Sally came about 7. They left Isabella better but not able to stand alone, and very thin.
- 30 Bright and cold. Sent Mrs. L. B. Burris check for 12. On Cit. Dep. Bk. Sent letter to Susan. Stayed in the house, left wrist and hand swelled up and painful. Sally had Dr. Williams up to look at it, and she rubbed it, &c. Isabella expects to come to her S. B. house for change.
- 31 Raining hard. Sally made me stay in bed till after lunch. Rained off and on. Sally went to see Mrs. Maude Hill. Sally and Frank preparing for Isabella's coming. Hard showers with hail. Sally told me there was snow on the mountains this morning. I got a letter from Miss Mary Selmes. Mrs. Maude Hill and friends and Mrs. Griggs came to tea. Dr. Williams called up to ask about me.

April

- 1 Bright and not quite so cool, John G. tele-something that they expected to be here to-morrow. Got envelope from Cit. Dep. Bk. Grant Ky. with duplicate of deposit by Flave Loudon of ½ check from Lexington 225.92. My left hand better
- 2 Sent letter to Beulah with 1.00. Bright day. Isabella, John, the baby, Dr. Patton, the nurse &c. came from Ajo to her home. John and Dr. Patton lunched with us. I got card from Sally Chenault. Went with Sally to see Isabella and the baby he is a lovely boy—saw John too. Mrs. Oliver came.

- 3 Bright and mild. Gen. G. came over after breakfast. Isabella slept well and is better. Got letter from Susie T. sent one to her. Got card as member of Museum Ass. for 1925. John took supper with us. I went to see Isabella in the morning and the baby.
- 4 Poured last night and early this morning and off and on all day long. John came over for me to go and see the baby bathed—saw Isabella for a minute. Bobby came up to see her for a little while, and she got a letter from Martha. John took supper here. Raining hard at night.
- 5 Sunday. Did n't write in this. John G. went away this morning—had to meet Directors. It was Palm Sunday and Sally went over to stay while the nurse went to church. After lunch I went to drive with Sally, we stopped to see Mrs. Oliver.
- 6 Clear day—went down town—got note from Fanny.
Got check from United Dyewood Cor. Apl 1st 52.50
Got check B. F. Goodrich Co. Apl. 1st 22.75
Went down town with Sally before lunch. Did n't rain last night or to-day.
- 7 Bright and warmer. Went down town. Got letters from Lily G. from Lizzie H. and note from Sally Vaughn. Went over to see the baby about 4. Isabella not so well. At night we all went to see Ruth Draper.
- 8 Bright and mild. Miss Ruth Draper and Mrs. Fithian came. Sent note to Louly Huey. Went down town to tea. Miss Draper came to see the baby. Miss Seaborg brought him over. Mrs. Dr. Williams came.
- 9 Sent letter to Lily G. Went down town with Sally. Warm like summer. Mr. and Mrs. Whitehead came.
- 10 Good Friday. Bright and mild, warm. Went down town with Sally. Sent letter to Susan. Cabell Breckinridge and Mr. Fairbanks came—they had come to Mrs. Hollister's ranch and went back. Bobby called up—said they had influenza at school.
- 11 My beloved sister Belle's birthday. Lovely day—like summer. Went down town and on to Mr. Bliss's place and to a point with a heavenly view and went down to the beach. Got a letter from Fanny. It was Edgegclif[f] we went to. Went to see Jack.
- 12 Easter Sunday—a beautiful summer day. Bobby and Peter Folger lunched here. Mrs. Whitehead stopped in to leave flower &c. for Mitty. Sally and I went to the beach down at Mrs. Douglas' cottages—beautiful.
- 13 Lovely summer day. Sally got my two checks (see 6th) cashed for me 75.50. I bought some things. Sent cas. cards to Miss Mary Selmes and Fanny Gibbon. Miss S. brought the baby to see us.
- 14 Hot summer day wind blew a glad day and night. Went with Sally down town before lunch—stayed home. Men worked here repairing things. Ther. 98°
- 15 Warm day but not so hot. Went down town with Sally. Sent letter to Julia F. Got letter from Susie T. Sally made appointment with Dr. Allen for me. Sat. 9.30 A.M. Sally and I went to tea at Mrs. Brown's met a lot of strangers. Went to see Isabella and the baby.
- 16 Lovely weather. Went down town and later to see Isabella and the baby.
- 17 Bright and warm, went down town with Sally. Sent letter to Amy Campbell, went to see the Historic Adobe and the antiques there. Sally said Isabella seemed better. Mrs. Rives came. Sally & F. dined out.
- 18 Lovely summer day. Sally went with me to the dentist Dr. Allen 15.00. Got a note from Mrs. Milliken with a check from St. Paul Title & Trust Co. for 17.00. Also a letter from Hector Ferguson on the train saying he had been home to visit Bob's grave.
- 19 Sunday. Bright and mild but windy. I sent a letter to Hector Ferguson. After lunch went over to see Isabella and Jack. Sally and Frank went to see Mrs. Fithian.
- 20 Cloudy and slight drizzling rain, chilly, fire. Sent letter to Julia Loving. Got letter from Susan telling about Hector M. Ferguson's visit 11th April to see Bob's grave &c. She also told me Topsy's mule colt was born Friday night and died Sat. night Susan's letter dated 14th. Also got a note from Mrs. Milliken inclosing F. W. M. Cutcheon's note for 106.25 int. I endorsed the note for 17.00 see 18th to

Frank and gave it to him. Also got notice of exhibits from S. B. Museum. We went to a Spanish music show—cold night.

- 21 Cold—sat by the fire. Sent letter to Susan.
Got check from Farmers & M. Wash. for 28.00
Got check from Metropolitan Bk. Wash. for 10.00
Mrs. and Mrs. Carl Palmer lunched here.
- 22 Horrid day. Rained most of the day a cold drizzle and harder at times. I sat by the fire. Mrs. Fithian came to tea.
- 23 Bright and cool. I got a note from Lizzie. After lunch Miss Seaborg brought Jackk over and we took him to Mrs. Olivers but she was not at home—then we took a long drive and I went to see Isabella—she seemed better.
- 24 Bright and warmer. Sent letter to Lizzie H. Mrs. Archie Driscoll of St. Paul and her son called here—she had 6 sons in the world war and they all came home safe. Went down town with Sally and after lunch went calling—no one at home. Went to the flower show that began. The whole town ablaze with flowers.
- 25 Summer again. Went down town with Sally. Got letters from Lily G. and Louly Huey. The mocking birds sang right by the house. Flowers everywhere—vines loaded with blooms. We went to meet John Greenway. Sally and Frank went to Carpenteria to see Bobby's gymkana. I sent letter to Lily. John G. came over at night.
- 26 Sunday. Bobby, John G. and Mr. Procter came to lunch. We went to see the Polo. Bobby told me goodbye. Sent letter to Susan. We went to see the baby. Santa B. full of flowers, at its best. We went to Mrs. Fithians.
- 27 Foggy and sunless. Went down town. Sent card to Sally Mallory. Sally got letter from Beulah. I sent note to Lucy J. John G. came to supper.
- 28 Heavy fog again and chilly disagreeable day. Sat by the fire and read. Sent note to Julia F. and one to Beulah with 1.00. Got note from Fanny and letter from Julia Loving. Went to a concert of Frieda Hempel with Sally and Frank—lovely.
- 29 Foggy. Frank not well last night. Sent notes to Fanny G. and Susie T. After lunch went driving with Sally who made calls. I called with her on Mr. and Mr. Bliss—did n't see them. Went to see Isabella and the baby. Sally went to Mrs. Cameron Rogers' lunch. She got for me from County Natl. Bk. the money she had put there for me 369.50.
- 30 Packed my trunks. Went down town with Sally and to tell Miss Thera Peterson and Mrs. Oliver good bye. Got letter from Lizzie H. and sent note to her. Went to see Isabella and the baby. John stopped by for Frank to go to movie.

May

- 1 Bright pretty day/ The men came for trunks took my two. Sally and Frank went to Mr. Cate's. I got letter from Susie Tew. Went to see Isabella and tell her and Jack goodbye. The baby is like a Covè [?] patient. Day by day, in every way he gets sweeter. Mr. Curtis Cate was thrown from his horse and unconscious—picked up on the mesa and carried here—came to.
- 2 Saturday. We all left on the morning train for New York. Sally, Frank, myself, Matheson his wife and Eden. After we left Los Angeles we began a long journey over the desert.
- 3 Sunday. We got to El Paso about 1.30 P.M. Passed Fort Bliss. Very hot and dusty in the desert, came by Tucumcari. Got to Kansas City at 9.30 P.M. Monday 4th.
- 5 Got to Chicago Tuesday 5th at 10.30 A.M. Went to the Blackstone—bathed and lunched. Left Chicago at 5.30 P.M. Rained hard after we got on the train. No dust.

- 6 Wednesday. We got to New York at 5.30 P.M. Major Hector met us at the station and we all went to 147 East 36th St. and Hector stayed till he had to go to dine with Mrs. Cutting. We stayed all night. A letter from Lucy Johnstone was there telling me Mr. Chenault died.
- 7 Thursday. We left N. Y. after 1 P.M. and went to Frank's Long Island place. Thank God for a safe journey for all. Damp and chilly.
- 8 Frank and Sally started for N.York. I forgot to state that when we got to N. York Sally gave me two checks one from

- I gave them endorsed to Frank to get cashed. Sun shining this morning. Frank brought me the money for the checks—they got home for dinner.
- 9 Saturday. Sally took me to see Harriet Jelke who showed me her house and garden. After lunch we went to Waterbury, Oxford St. to Willie Tew's. Saw Mrs. Schott, Eleanore, Dinsmore &c. Took tea with them.
- 10 Sunday. They got a telegram that Bobby was Cap. of his team against Thatchers! and was at the games. This evening Willie and Dinsmore came to see us.
- 11 We went to New York—it rained. Belle and Mary Marvin came to see us. Then Mrs. Robinson came and then Nita and Laura Furness. Then we took the train, Frank with us.
- 12 We got to Cincinnati. Harry met us. Sally telephoned Julia. We came down. Country green and pretty. Met road menders. Got home all right and found home so Thank God. Very cool had a good fire in the dining room. Beulah here.
- 13 My beloved parent's wedding day—cloudy and cool. Had fire all day. After dinner Harry went to Cincinnati in his Dodge station car and brought my two trunks down, Susan and Dave went and Susan got a lot of things for me. Harry paid 1.02 on one trunk and no charge on the other. I paid him 10 to be charged to his account and 5.00 to Dave. Susan spent for me 21.68 I pd her 21.75.
- 14 Elmer Jarrell came out to see about getting Flave's place. I told him no, I had other plans. Had cold getting better—fires in the dining room.
- 15 Man with a trunk passed selling oil cloth. I bought a piece for 5.00. Went with Susan to look at the house Flave left and barns. Sally had bad cold. David Garnett came in to settle. He said he began to work February 13th and had worked for me 36 ½ days at 1.50 a day which came to 54.75. He got 5.00 the 13th which left 49.75. He said he had worked for Harry 13 days which came to 19.50 and Harry asked me to pay him this and charge it to him so I gave David Garnett a check for 69.25 on Cit. Dep. Bank in full to date. Warmer to-day and pleasanter than since we came home. Sally hears from Frank by telephone as he is in Cincinnati hearing a case!
- 16 Warmer and breezy—sprinkled a little. David Garnett got his motor 150.00! so Harry said and put out with it. I went with Harry to Bellevue to the Bank took my book and left it. Deposited 150. went to Mrs. Burns and the stores and asked them to get their accounts ready next week. Some young man came and cleaned 3 cistern house, kitchen and Harry's and I paid him 8.00. Flave Louden came to see me he brought an account for work he said he had done of 30.00 and 1.30 for ferriage on tobacco. I gave him a check for 31.30 on Cit. Dep. Bk. Harry went to Cincinnati for Frank Cutcheon and brought him down. It rained hard with thunder afterwards. Later Tom Loudon came and said I owed him 7.00 for work and I paid him cash.
- 17 Sunday. Damp and chilly had fire. Sally still poorly with a bad cold.
- 18 Beautiful bright day. Sent note to Lucy J. got letter from Lizzie H. Sally nearly sick with a cold.
- 19 Frank started for Cin. at 7.30. Harry got back by 1 P.M. Joe West came to see me about work. Harry took home a borrowed corn planter and I sent by him 2.40 to Fred Birkle for shoeing Frank.
- 18 When I got my Bank Book and checks home there was one of 18th June paid to Harry Roseberry 50.00—see checks.

June

- 6 Saturday. Frank Cutcheon took my check for the calf see . to the Cit. Dep. Bk. and had it deposited and brought me a certificate. It had been mislaid because of my illness. I got a letter to-day from Mrs. Laura Dinsmoor. I had influenza, and that accounts for my not writing in my book. Frank also took down 120.00 and had it deposited in Cit. Dep. Bk. Since I was sick Dr. Furnish has been to see me and Sally. Also we had 3 nurses and still have two. They were Miss Sally Lot_on Rising Sun, and a Miss Leila E. Miller Riverside and Miss Louise Rummel Newport. Dr. Furnish was down Friday June 5th and said he dismissed us as patients. It has been very hot off and on 94° on the gallery sometimes and thunder and hopes of rain—some Sat. night.
- 7 Poor Patsy's wedding day. Cooler after the rain last night. Susan and her family went to her brother's party—last night and said it had rained much more where she went. Flora came to see me this morning and later Lily and Frances came in the evening. Susan said Cleo came late.
- 8 Monday. Frank had Mr. Lindsay come down for him. Miss Rummel went up to Cin. with him for the day. I gave Frank my will to leave at the Bank in Burlington and money to pay for the rent of my box also his check for to be deposited there and my bank book which he left to be balanced. Between 11 and 12 we had a rain with thunder. Frank and Miss Rummel came back about 5.
- 9 Bright and no rain last night. Julia & Lily F. came out to work. Sent Mrs. Laura B. Burns check for 9.00 in full for Beulah's board.
- 10 Miss Lila E. Miller and Miss Louise Rummel the trained nurses went away this morning before 8 with Frank who had Mr. Lindsay come for them. It is cool and bright. I put in the P.O. box, by Beula, an envelope directed to Mrs. Laura B. Burns Grant P.O. a check for 9.00 on Cit. Dep. Bk. Harry went to Bellevue and I got him to get the letter out of the box and take it to Mrs. Burns, he gave it to her. Harry brought Miss Arty Ryle. It turned cool. The weather has jumped from one extreme to the other.
- 11 Thursday. Very cool night and morning. Received by mail my Bank book that Frank left at the Boone Co. Dep. Bk. Walked in the yard. Still very dry. Johnny Presser who is working on the dam came out and patched the ceiling of the room over the parlor—he put the first coat of plaster on and left it to dry—he worked two hours. Harry helped him. I saw Harry working in the garden and the dust blew from its harrow.
- 12 Just a month since we got home cool last night and this morning. Turned very hot--91° on the gallery with hot wind. Got letter from Lizzie H. said she was going to Tuckaway Inn Sewanee.
- 13 Cooler and sprinkled sometimes before noon, had showers after and it was very cool. Sally got a note from Fanny G. Johnny Presser came out and finished patching the ceiling in the room over the parlor. Harry waited on him. He charged 3.00.
- 14 Sunday. Cloudy and tolerably cool at first but turned very hot. Frank went up to call on Lily and Frances. We had a shower in the evening. Joe West was out and said he had a sore foot that prevented his working.
- 15 Julia came out to wash and said they had a good rain in Bellevue last night. Harry received his check for a second payment under participation cert[i]ficate no. 91618 of the 1923 crop. My share 49.50. Less Total deductions 10.36, Check for the balance due \$99.00. Tried to call up Julia—got to talk a minute and was cut off. Got from Boone Co. Dep. Bk. a slip of int. 2.13. Harry went to Cit. Dep. Bk. with Frank and brought me Cer. of Dep. Flave Louden came and brought me Cer. of Dep. for 194.76 my half of his tobacco money of crop.
- 16 Had a good rain last night—thank God everything looks better and I think there is a season and prospect of more rain. Sally and Frank started for Cin. on the way to Locust Valley at a little before 9 A.M. with Harry. I sent by Frank letter to Julia Foster. Got a note from Julia by mail. Harry came home before the rain—it sprinkled off and on and between six and 7.15 there was a pouring rain. Harry got lock, screws, sections [?] 3.00.

- 17 Did n't write in this—cloudy day. Thundered and looked like rain but only some sprinkles. Harry set out his own tobacco and some tomato plants and sweet potatoes. A receipt for Gully's bill 15.61 came that Sally paid. Got a letter from Sally with one from Isabella. Harry says Sally got 12 bushels of whippoorwill peas and a truck brought them.
- 18 Cloudy and warm. Sent letter to Sally and to Susie Tew. Got bill of 7.00 from Vet. Dr. Ryle.
Settlement with Harry
Our last settlement was July 26 1924 see page 140. Since then to date I owed him a balance of 46.25. I gave him a check for 50.00 on Cit. Dep. Bk. I also made him a present of the 50.00 I had paid Dr. Yelton of Burlington for him one of the advances alluded to in the former settlement.
Went upstairs.
- 19 Cool and bright. Got letter from Sally in N. Y. and note from Lizzie Hodges. Susan went to Covington and Beulah went with her to shop. I paid Susan 20.00 on her work. Harry of course went and the family. They got back at seven. Julia Foster came down after lunch with Rosamond Foster and Richard Westcott a neighbor's child. They left at 4. Susan bought some things for me.
- 20 Warm and sunny. Had little letter from Sally at L. Island. Sent check to Dr. Ryle Vet. For 7.00 see 18. Harry worked putting in drill whippoorwill peas with drill lent b y Bernard Rogers—in Front of yard gate. Dave said he worked. I paid him 5.25 paid Mr. W. postage 11 cts. Sent letter to Sally. Belle Clore and Laura came to see me. Cooler at night.
- 21 Sunday. Still hot. Flora gave us some butter. There was a big baptizing in the colored church beyond Burlington and our Isaac Sanders stopped by to see us with all his family except Milton the oldest boy—he lives at 118 Rockaway Avenue Delhi, Ohio. His Patty is sixteen. Later in the evening Mrs. Ora Rogers and Viola Rogers stopped by on their way home from Bullitsburg meeting to see Miss Arty and me.
- 22 Joe West came out to work—he put up the screens round the kitchen porch. Harry hauled out the rotten potatoes from the wine cellar. Beulah came home. Flora came to see us. Sent letter to Sally—got picture papers from Sally. Harry said he ploughed in the garden till noon then ploughed his corn.
- 23 Rained during the night—all night perhaps. We had our first spring chicken for dinner. Harry mowed the yard with the machine. I sent note to Fanny Gibbon and Susie Tew. Miss Arty went to her sister's. The whippoorwill peas Harry drilled in the piece in front of the yard were up to-day, he drilled them Saturday. Dave asked me to lend him 12.00 (twelve) and I gave him a check for 12. On Cit. Dep. Bk. Saw in the Enquirer that Sally Woolley had gone to Europe with Mrs. Winslow.
- 24 Forgot to write in this. Got letter and clippings &c. from Sally and letter from Susie Tew saying she expected to be in Cincinnati July 2nd. Dave cut weeds and grubbed some dock by the gallery. Harry mowed weeds &c. This is St. John's day the longest of the year. Rained.
- 25 Harry went for Julia she and Lily Frances washing. Mr. Brown who married Grace Scott came by to telephone. Harry said he was ploughing corn. Dave cutting weeds. I got S. Envelopes .58. Harry told me that the corn had given out and that I had to buy feed for the horses. Such farming! Harry took Julia and Lily F. home I paid them 2.00 apiece, and Harry bought me thread .30. Cool. Joe W. worked ½.
- 26 Still cool but fair. I got letter from Sally telling me she wanted Harry to meet her at Penn. station 30th morning. Annie Myrtle fell down and hurt her shoulder so that her parents took her out to see Dr. Yelton started at a quarter of 11 and got back a few minutes after an hour and a half. The Dr. said her collar bone was broken and bandaged her. Harry said the truck brought 9 bus. on to Harry and Dave and Mr. West worked putting in cowpeas.
- 27 Sent letter to Frank, Julia and Lizzie. Got note from Julia written yesterday, saying early this morning two o'clock Will died. He had been sick since Sunday but I had not known of it! Poor Julia. Joe West said he finished sowing the whippoorwill peas and had just enough seed. He got done about 10 A.M.

Harry wanted money to pay Mr. Stucky and I paid him 4.00 cash. Later Lily and Frances came to see me.

- 28 Sunday. Bright day. Sent by Harry a letter to Julia Foster he put in the P.O. at Florence. Threate[ne]d a storm passed over and in the night a thunderstorm and _____. Beulah went home with Lena.
- 29 Got note from Susie Tew saying to send for them Friday July 3d at 11 A.M. at the Grand Hotel. Harry set out tobacco and Dave too. He found Susan's cow with a steer calf.
- 30 Harry started for Cin. to meet Sally. He got off an 7.15. He brought out Julia and Lily F. before. Amy's William telephoned about Sally's telegrams. Got by mail a letter from Julia and card from C. E. McNeely Cit. Dep. Bk. saying I had credit for div. of 12.00. Paid Julia and Lily 3.00. The day beloved sister Belle died. Sally came with telegrams and papers about the earthquake in Santa Barbara. Isabella radioed or telegraphed 'all right.' Sally did n't know all night from N. Y. to Cin. if Isabella and family were safe! Sally telephoned Julia F. Sally worked like a beaver with the men moving furniture &c. to get the room over the kitchen ready. Beulah came home. Harry took Miss Arty to Petersburg. Joe West worked in the garden. Lily Grant called up about the earthquake.

July

- 1 Sent note to Isabella—got letter from Julia F. and Fanny G. Cool day and bright. Joe W. worked—cut bean poles and mowed in the yard. I got Telephone bill. Mr. Colon Kelly and wife Mrs. Riggs and Mr. and Mrs. Ricketts stopped by to see the place. Ethel worked cleaning the house.
- 2 Did n't write in this. Got letters from Miss Mary Selmes, Fanny G. Lucy J., Lizzie and Laura D. Sent letter to Julia F. Joe worked in year garden and hay. They got in 2 loads of weedy alfalfa. Susan took Ethel to the ferry—there was thunder lightning and prospect of a storm but it passed by. Susan said it rained at Belleview. Turned hot 94° in the shade.
- 3 Settled with Sally—she had paid for the whip-poor-will peas 58.80 and a bill of Gully's 15.61 and I paid her cash for both. Sent Harry to Cin. to meet Susie Tew—he started at 9.10. Hot as pepper again. Got notes from Frances Hill and Lizzie and from Frank two checks one from United Dyewood Cor. for 52.50 and one B. F. Goodrich for 22.75.
Harry brought Susie Tew and Miss M. Shields down—they got here about 2 ahead of a threatened thunder storm. Harry went back with his truck and brought down three trunks. Odille Susie's cook came with them and Harry brought her trunk one of the 3. Dave went with him. Susie brought a canary.
- 4 Hot as pepper. Thunder and lightning and looked like storms but passed by. Sally worked like a beaver arranging things. Dave was paid 3.00 on his work. Miss M. E. Roberts candidate stopped by.
- 5 Sunday. Hot day. Isaac and family stopped by to see us. Cleo was down with her baby.
- 6 Monday. Sally went away about 9 A.M. Susan went with them. I got from Frank 3 checks

During the day thunder storms threatened but no rain. Harry and Susan got back. Dave weeded and hoed watermelons &c. see 3^d. I gave Sally Goodrich check 22.75 and she gave me a 20.00 bill. Very hot day. I got letter from Julia Loving.
- 7 Harry went down and brought Julia and Lily F. who washed. Between 11 and 12 there was a good rain, and Julia and F. went home. Later there was a very heavy rain.
- 8 Sent check on Boone Co. Dep. Bk. to Consolidated Telephone for 8.90. Sent Sally a letter and an envelope that came for her from Frank. Fog. Harry and Susan went to Covington.
- 9 Neglected writing in my book. Went to Bellevue to Bank. Left my bank book there. Went to Mr. Charles Dolph's and paid him in full with a check on Cit. Dep. Bk. for 7.49. Went to Mr. Hensley's store and paid his account with a check on Cit. Dep. Bk. for 44.50. Went to Mr. Stephens' store and

paid his account that had been running since Jan. with a check on Cit. Dep. Bk. for ~~I think~~ 96.34. I think Julia and Lily worked.

- 10 Sent letter to Sally. Agent for brushes came. I got one for .35.
- 11 Saturday. Joe worked ½ day pulling and cutting weeds. Got telegrams Sally sent about Santa B. Beulah went to Flave's.
- 12 Sunday—last night had one of the worst thunder storms we have had for years—from a quarter to 2 till half past three constant lightning and thunder, and a down pour. It did much damage in the barn lot a large walnut tree caved off carrying much ground with it into a gully and many washes were started. The bottoms were covered and corn beat down and uprooted. Dave said that as he came home from a party the road was in places a running stream and trees down. It sounded like what I imagine a barrage was, and as if anything in the yard was struck. Very hot day. Harry's family went over the river to Ethel's and Susan says a boy told of tobacco and ground being washed away. Beulah came back. About dark there was another thunderstorm—very crashing and near but not so long, as the other one. Heat very oppressive to-day.
- 13 Monday. Gave Harry 3.00 to pay for shoeing the work horses. He dug my potatoes and his own—little marbles. He said I had 2 ½ bus. and he had more. Got letter from Sally.
- 14 Got letter from Mrs. Matt Graves. Joe worked in the garden partly. Harry got a jar of lard 60 lbs. with jar—price 20 cents.
- 15 Harry worked in the garden first then cut some alfalfa and oats. Sent letter to Mrs. Matt (Mentor) Graves. Got letter from Sally and note from Miss Arty. Beulah went to the barber's and then went with Harry's family and Odille to Covington.
- 16 Cleared up and Harry said they got in 3 three loads of alfalfa. Joe helped and a Robinson black boy who came to see Dave. Julia and Lily came and ironed. I paid 3.00.
- 17 Sally telephoned she was in Cin. and was coming down to-day. It was much cooler. Harry said he bought a pitchfork. Sally and Frank came before supper time. Mr. Lindsay brought them down.
- 18 Dave Garnett said his work for me came to 18.25. He wanted to allow me 6.00 on the 12.00 he borrowed so I have him a check on Cit. Dep. Bk. for 12.28. I paid A. A. Robinson 5.00 cash for work in hay at 2.50 a day.
- 19 One of the saddest memories of my life. Sunday. Harry was telephoned to go for Cleo who after a quarrel with Sanders wanted to come home. Harry brought her. After dinner he took Sally and Frank and me to Lily Grant's. I paid Lily for the seed corn Harry said he got from her 6.80. A beautiful cool day.
- 20 I got Frank to cash Dyewood check (see 3^d) for 52.50. Gave Harry 20. To get check lines and bridles. Frank and Sally started for Cin. at 8.10. I got letter from Lizzie H. Harry got lines &c. and brought me the bill and 7.00. There was a thunderstorm and pouring rain before he got home—the cows could n't be brought over the creek. Harry said two swam over in the night. A snake was in the clematis vine next my door. Dave killed it.
- 21 Cloudy and sprinkled. Sent letter to Lizzie. Got letter from Sally about carpet and one from Julia F. It rained slightly off and on and at 9 P.M. there was a pouring rain with thunder.
- 22 Did n't rain to-day. Sent letter to Sally. Got one from Fanny G. Harry mowed in the yard with machine. After the grass dried off Harry said Dave and Aubrey turned and scattered the hay—and he cut some. He said Joe worked at weeds. It turned cool and cooler at night.
- 23 Very cool. The men after the grass was dry worked turning the hay—they brought in two loads. Joe and Aubrey helped Harry. I sent letter to Fanny.
- 24 Rather warmer—the men worked in the hay and hauled . Joe worke[d] a while in the yard cutting weeds &c. I bought envelopes and stamps 6.00. Sent letter to Miss Arty. Harry said he shipped my calf.

- 25 Paid Dave 6.00 cash on his work. Paid Harry a check for 15.00 on Cit. Dep. Bk. Paid Susan 12.65 in a check on Cit. Dep. Bk. Dave said Aubrey Robinson had worked 4 days at 2.00 = 10.00 and he had 4.00 coming to him so I gave Dave a check for 14.00 made out to Aubrey on Cit. Dep. Bk. I sent Harry to Cin. to Alms & Doepke's for the carpet Sally bought there of course with a letter. Susan and Odille went too on their own hook. They got back at 3.15 P.M. just before a rain. It thundered hard a good while before that but Harry got home with the carpet all right. Dave said they got in the rest of the hay that was cut. Joe worked ½ day—helping them and trimming the rambler rose by the garden gate.
- 26 Sunday. Cool and cloudy most of the day cooler at night so we sat in doors.
- 27 Sent letter to Sally, got one from her and one from Lizzie H. who is going to Memphis and not well. Got returns from the calf Harry shipped Friday. It weighed 184 lbs. at 11 cts. = 20.24. Expenses 2.01 bal. 18.23. He sent a check on Pearl Market Bk. signed William Kisker, for John V. R. & Co. Ida Koons brought 10 lbs. honey paid 2.50. Dave and Aubrey cut the tree in the barn lot where the walnut tree fell a rotten black locust—cool.
- 28 Sent a letter to Lizzie to Memphis and on[e] to Miss Petie. They put the hay in shocks and hauled in one load. Joe worked helped on hay and worked on rose. So cool we sat in the house at night.
- 29 Sent letter to Sally and postcard to Lizzie H. Got letter from Sally. Cool but rather warmer. Harry said they got 3 loads of hay in the alfalfa and oats mixed—they hauled out the dead parts of the roses. Joe helped a little in the hay and mowed and fixed the rose bush by the front gate. Aubrey worked. Beulah went to a party with Ben.
- 30 Went to Bellevue and to Bank. Got Kisker's check for 18.23 cashed and took the money. Paid Mr. Dolph 1.25. Went to Stephen's store and paid his bill of 20.24 by check on Cit. Dep. Bk. got my bank Book. Took down Susie's and Miss Shield's bag of clothes to Julia J. David Garnett asked me to let him have 12.00 so I gave him a check for that on Cit. Dep. Bk. as partly a loan his work he said amounted to 6.00. Aubrey Robinson said his work had come to 6.00 which I paid him cash before Harry. Joe worked cutting bushes & weeds. It sprinkled and rained and was very dark.
- 31 Rained early. I got 2 letters from Sally.

August

- 1 Went down to vote for Miss M. E. Rogers and Judge Riddell. Voted for Miss Rogers. Judge R. was already nominated without any opponent. Stopped at Hensley's and paid him 1.40 for _ath that Joe West got. Mr. Dolph had got the band or what was needed for the motor and Harry went back about noon and had it put in the car. I sent letter to Sally. Harry brought out from Julia J's the washing of Susie and Miss S.
- 2 Sunday. Foggy early—thundered & sprinkled before 11. Harry and family and Odille went over the river to church. I paid Harry 3.00 cash. Flora and Will came over after dinner.
- 3 Thundered and rained as usual, but off and on only. Harry and Dave went after stock animal—after their dinner went to the big pasture and deadened a small buckeye tree that Flora told me about and brought the green nuts for me to see and fixed a watergap. Joe dug the onions and cut weeds. I got letter from Lizzie H. Got box of candy from Sally.
- 4 Had Joe West working in the yard till his dinner, trimming roses mowing &c. Harry and Dave were working in the garden. I went to see Louly Huey about Hilda's lot that Joe said Mr. Deck sent word about. Susie and Miss Shields went for the drive. Took Bob. From Paris to N. Y. by Land and May Johnston's War Novel [?]. Sent letters to Sally and Julia F. Patty and Julia J. washed here. Beulah went with Ben.
- 5 Beautiful day. Sent letter to Sally Chenault. Got letter from Sally and 2 check from Frank
Am. Light and Traction Co. 30.00
Am. Gas and Electric Co. 37.50

Harry and Dave worked in tobacco. Joe cut weeds and worked in the yard. Warmer. Distant thunder after 3 P.M.

- 7 Harry mowed with machine in yard and lot. Joe cut weeds and trimmed roses for me I think. Harry said Dave picked up rocks in alfalfa. Almost all went to a show boat. Harry shipped a calf. Hot again.
- 8 Last night had rain with much thunder. Sent letter to Sally—got one from her and the book Frank sent me, *The Chaste Diana*, and a letter from Julia. Also got the return from the calf (little Dixie's) that Harry shipped. The check is from the Morris Brock Co. for 16.80. The calf weighed 150 lbs. at 12 ½ came to 18.75 expenses brought it to 16.80. I have 2 checks from Tri-State Butter Co. for cream one dated July 28th for 4.62 one dated Aug. 4 for 4.39. Harry was going to Bellevue so I endorsed these 3 and he brought me the cash 25.81 and some groceries. Dave said he worked 3 days this week and I paid him cash in full 4.50.
- 9 Sunday. Hot day. Harry took Cleo up to her husband's to get her things. Lily, Frances, Elizabeth and Mr. Strother came.
- 10 Monday. Harry went down for Julia and Patty Smith. I paid Julia 3.00 cash. I got letters from Miss Mary Selmes and Lizzie H. in Memphis and a bus. of stuffed dates from Sally. Harry said he mowed in the pike and Dave picked up rocks in alfalfa. Very hot.
- 11 Rained last night. Thundered hard and rain at 3 o'clock and sprinkled too. I sent letters to Sally and Miss Mary Selmes. Turned hot and rained at night. Harry said they were getting up rock.
- 12 Rained hard off and on. Joe went home it rained so—and was hot during the day. I sent letter to Lizzie to Carthage. Got letter and book from Sally, on Shelly. Harry worked in his garden. Beulah went visiting. Went to look at tenant house with Susan.
- 13 Cloudy early—rained a little near noon was clear in the afternoon. A car full of Susie's company came from Cin. Mrs. Collins and two daughters—Grace and Harriet Mrs. and Miss Yates. Beulah came back before supper. Harry and Dave worked part of the time for him.
- 14 My darling Patsy's birthday—may she rest in perfect peace. A cooler day. The men did I know not what except that they got in a load of hay that had been in the rain. I had the staircase closet cleaned. Got a cream check for 3.48. Cool night.
- 15 At 6.30 it was 62°. Bright. Sent letter to Lucy J. Julia Foster came down in the afternoon with Rosamond and Foster. Beulah went to Big Bone dance again with Sebe Brady. Dave said he wanted 5.00 and I let him have it on his work. Harry went to Bellevue and I sent by him the cream check for 3.48 see yesterday and got it cashed. He worked for himself and went to the ball game. Beulah went to Big Bone dance.
- 16 Sunday. 60° at 6 A.M. Cool and pleasant. Susan had a tribe of company from Cin. Cleo's husband came down again for her. Had my first watermelon.
- 17 The day my mother died. Her prayer was granted—she did not wish to live till old age. Sent letter to Sally and note to Lily Grant. Got letters from Sally. Cleo went back with Sanders!! Had first cucumbers off my vines. Mrs. Hughes came and with a Mrs. Geitz? A daughter of Joe Stile who used to work for papa and she was born on the place and wanted to visit her birth place. She lives in Chattanooga. Mrs. Hughes lives in the former Toll house near Burlington. Mrs. Geitz was 53 fifty-three. Cleo left her husband and came to Harry's July 19—'Souvent femme vari' [woman is often fickle]. Julia and Patty Smith worked to-day and I paid her 3.00 by Harry who took them home.
- 18 Joe cut weeds around the house Flave left. I never saw such big weeds. I think Harry hauled some rock. After his dinner he pulled some of his watermelons about 20 and took them to Burlington to Mr. Kirkpatrick he said he got 7.50 for them—gave me 3.50 and kept the .50 for expenses. It was a very hot day—melting. I got a letter from Lizzie H.
- 19 Very hot day—89° in the shade. I sent the pay 1.00 and .25 for the medicine Dr. Furnish sent to Cov. Drug store. Got letters from Sally, Fanny G. and note from Julia Loving. Joe cut weeds at Flave's

deserted place. Harry and Dave hauled some rock into the caved hole. Harry and family and Odille went to Cin. and Beulah to Rabbit Hash to a show. Thundered and rained at night.

- 20 Raining steadily. Harry got me a doz. lemons .30. So dark I could n't see to do anything. Got note from Lily and check for 4.06 from Cream Co.
- 21 Sent letter to Sally—got one from her and Kermit Roosevelt's book that I sent to her for and letter from Lizzie Hodges about coming Sept. 1st. I think Harry and Dave chopped weeds in his corn. Joe did n't come out. Beulah went to McVile.
- 22 Sent letters to Sally, Amy Campbell and Lizzie. At 7 A.M. 58°. The telephone man came and examined our telephone and fixed it. Sent letter to Fanny G. Harry took some melons off to sell—said he got 8.40 kept .40 for gasoline gave me 4.00. I had given him 1.50 to get some beef and bread, he brought me .31 back. Beulah came home. Very cool at night.
- 23 Sunday. 55° at 7 A.M. Bright. Harry and his family went to Susan's step-father's. Tom Loudon came down and showed his divorce papers to the servants and Beulah went home with him and spent the day.
- 24 Cool 56° at 7 A.M. Sent letter to Sally. Got letter from her and box of dates and letter from Lucy J. Lizzie Hodges—and Miss Petey, and Jamie Tew. This is my beloved father's birthday—may he be in perfect peace. Julia J. and Patty Smith worked here. I paid Julia by Harry 3.00 cash. Dave Garnett wanted 8.00 and I paid him by a check for 8.00 on Cit. Dep. Bk. Harry said they worked in his corn and after noon hauled rock off the alfalfa. Joe cut weeds.
- 25 Sent letters to Sally, Jamie Tew and Lizzie H. Got envelopes .50. After dinner went to Bellevue and to Bank. Got cream check for 4.06 cashed and took the money (see 20th). Paid Hensley .67 cents for syrup &c. Went to Stephens and paid him in full to date from July 31st with a check for 16.75 on Cit. Dep. Bk. Got coffee & bread at Brown's for .60. Saw Dode Pope. Left Bank Book to be checked up. Very cool early, warm and dusty later. Harry and Dave hauled some rock off alfalfa to hole in barn lot. Dode Pope stopped by and looked at Flave's house.
- 26 Got from Sally a box of goodies. Turned hot again. Dave told me they hauled 2 loads of rock. Joe cut weeds. Susan's step-sister and children left. Harry took them at night. Beulah went visiting with Sebe. Harry went to hunt his hogs in the morning. Dave helped him.
- 27 Warmer. Sent letter to Sally—got picture card from her at Pittsfield also letter from Lizzie H. and cream check for 4.01. Harry and Dave hauled rock and coal ashes to the washed hole in barn lot. At night went to Erlanger. I paid Harry 5.00 and Dave 2.00 by Harry. Cordy and Ott Scott and Mr. and Mrs. Yates stopped by to see me on their way to Flora's. Joe cut weeds. Harry got me Hair Tonic 1.00.
- 28 Warm and bright—got postcard from Sally of the Saratoga battle monument—commemorating the surrender of Burgoyne where grandpa Dinsmore fought when he was sixteen. I think Harry and Dave worked in Harry's corn. Sally was on her way to Saratoga Springs.
- 29 Sent letter to Sally—got one from Jamie Tew and postcards with note from John and Isabella at Grand Canyon, and lizard paper weight from Sally. Harry and Dave worked in the garden some. Dave wanted 4.00 and I paid him 4.00 cash. Harry went to Bellevue and I got him to cash cream check for 4.01 see 27th. Hot. Beulah went to Big Bone and McVile.
- 30 Sunday. Hot. Harry's family went to Walton. Isaac stopped by a minute.
- 31 Julia and Patty Smith washed. The Kelly twins came. Harry mixes whitewash—he and Dave spent most of the day hunting Harry sow. I got letter and cards from Sally.

September

- 1 Wrote and sent letter to Sally, and told her about Harry's meeting her the 8th. I did n't write in this. Harry and Dave whitewashed on the paling. Joe worked cutting weeds.

- 2 Got letter from Lucy J. telling me they would be at Erlanger on the morning train which was due there about 10. Got the letter at quarter of 10 and Harry went out for them after we telephoned them and Lucy and Sally got here before noon. Harry and Dave went on with the paling. Before they did that they whitewashed the necessary. Harry inside and Dave out and Beulah scrubbed it. Lucy and Sally looked delicate.
- 3 We all stayed with our company and talked! The men finished the paling and worked on the old buggy house. Dave wanted a dollar 1.00 and I paid it to him. Got a picture card from Lizzie H. 92° Very hot.
- 4 68° at 7 A.M. Turned hot. After breakfast took my company down to McVile to see the dam very interesting sight—boats passed through motor boats. The new houses for the men who work the dam were made &c. Went to the Bank and signed for Susie Tew and Miss Shields to get their check or drafts cashed. Got my cream check for 4.11 cashed and and [sic] got from bank Went to Erlanger with Lucy Johnstone and Sallie Chenault who wanted the take the 4 o'clock train for Lexington. Got a bunch of notes changed to a 50. Note for Miss Shields and Odille, gave Mr. Cropper 1.00 to pay my box rent and got 10. On my account. It was hot dry and very dusty. Stopped at Gulley & Pettit's in Burlington and pd. his bill to date 18.24 with a check on Boone Co. Dep. Bk. in Erlanger, got a bottle of Pluto for Beulah .40. When I got home gave or paid Joe West a check for 20.00 on Cit. Dep. Bk.
- 5 Harry went to Cin. to meet Jamie Tew and his sons James D. and John B. they got here about 9.30. Sent for things by Harry amounting to 4.00. Dave said he had worked 4 days this week and wanted the pay 6.00 which I paid him. Cool morning but turned hot. Jamie took us all down to see the dam.
- 6 Sunday. Hot day. Jamie took us to see Lily Grant. Got gasoline at Mr. Brown's—paid 2.00. Stopped at Flora's not at home. After supper Jamie and the boys went to Cin. to take the train. Harry took them. Sunday. Lightened and thundered during the evening—between 9 and 10 rained slightly. Harry says he got home before midnight.
- 7 Hot and bright. Mr. Leonard Gibson of R. Sun stopped by having been hiking with boy Scouts. Dave went away for the holiday. Beulah went to the ball game &c. with her cousin John Presser and his bride Miss Butler. Very hot.
- 8 Harry took the 3 trunks to have them checked. Susie went with him—they started at 7.05. Harry met Sally at the Penn. Station and she came down with them. I sent for things.
- 9 Susie and Miss Shields left about 10 A.M. and Odille with them. Beulah went away and it rained just after she got back. It rained little shower, before they left. Harry got back at dark. Beulah went to Johnny's wedding supper. It rained and thundered during the night. Susan cooked breakfast this morning. This is my mother's birthday and the day buddy died. Harry got a spring for the Buick and Sally paid for it. Thundered a little during the night and showered. It was 94° in the shade.
- 10 The birthday of my darling sister Susie. Sprinkled once—hot day. Harry worked with the motor this morning and took Sally to Bellevue to see Miss Cason after dinner. He got 5 from me for his insurance. He showed me an ear of corn and said he would gather some corn to feed his sow. Dave said he cut briers in fence row, and I paid him 1.00 on his work. Beulah went to Flave's but did n't stay. I got a letter from Lucy Johnstone.
- 11 Very hot 90° in the shade. Harry cut alfalfa. Dave cut briers. I got postcard from Susie in Cin. letter from Lizzie and check for 3.93 from Tri-state Butter. Harry gave me 1.00 watermelon money.
- 12 Not quite so hot. We heard by telephone that Louly Huey's daughter Franklinia died yesterday morning. Cloudy all day. Dave got 5.00. Flora Arnold came to see us. I sent letter to Mr. Ballard.
- 13 Sunday. It began to rain about 8 last night and during the night rained hard without thunder. We turned the rain in to the house cistern. Lily and Frances came to dine and spend the day. Frances went on to the funeral of Louly Huey's daughter. Sunday. Joe West came out to settle. By his book he had worked 60 ½ days which came to 121.00. I had paid him a check for 20.00 (see 4th) and I paid

him 1.00 cash and a check for 100.00 on Cit. Dep. Bk. He forgot to bring his account of fresh meat at hog killing and that is to go on his next work. Mrs. Mary Roberts Craven's stopped by to see us—she lives on the road to Hebron—used to live at Robert's Mills. Her son was with her in a car. It quit raining and was pleasant.

- 14 Cloudy. Got postal from Susie in N. O. School began and Beulah went. Sally went down to see Miss Annie Cason about boarding Beulah &c. I did n't write in this until Wednesday. Dave cut weeds and Joe too.
- 15 Got little note from Jimmy Tew and letter from Julia with picture of the children. Julia and Patty came to wash. Beulah went to school. Sally would pack my things.
- 16 Sent note to Jimmy Tew. Harry began to cut cowpeas. Julia and Patty Smith ironed here. I paid them 6.00. Went to Bellevue to Bank—had two checks cashed the one from Mr. Youell the road mender for the stone he got 9.50 and the cream check 3.93 see 11th got a check book and left my Bank book to be added up. Left a basket with silver in the Bank. Went to Mr. Dolph's and paid him by check 8. Went to Mr. Stephens and paid him by check (both on Cit. Dep. Bk.) 20.10 and bought bread .15. Stopped to speak to Miss Annie Cason about Beulah. Went to see Dode Pope about repairing the tenant house &c. Mrs. Martin stopped by to see us. Dode Pope came out later with Mrs. Pope to look at the tenant house and he is to give me an estimate of the cost of repairs and fix it for him to occupy.
- 17 I sent letters to Lizzie H. Susie Tew and Julia and sub. to Poetry to Miss Harriet Monroe a check for 3.00 on Boone Co. Dep. Bk. Got letters from Susie and Jamie and check for 3.98 from Cream Co. Bought of Harry 3 (three) of his hogs, all barrows, white with black spots for 26.00 apiece = 78. Mrs. Bondurant Jim Moreland's [?]
Settlement with Harry
Harry said he had worked 74 days. He had received \$32.00. Leaving 42.00 & he charged me 21.00 for Dave's board = 63.00 and I gave him 2 checks on Boone Co. Dep. Bk. one for the 63.00 and one for the three hogs 78.00.
- 18 Gave Dave a check for 16.00 on Cit. Dep. Bk. He wants to pay on his automobile. Told Harry to see that he worked &c. Beulah went to school with the expectation of staying with Miss Annie Cason at a dollar a day! Left home Sally and I about 8.50 in Harry's Dodge. Stopped at Burlington at the Courthouse and paid my taxes 347.78—by check on Boone Co. Bk. Then I went to Boone Co. Dep. Bk. and told the young man probably Mr. Kelly and about the checks given to Harry 63.00 and 78.00 and he told me I [had] \$60.00 left in Bank! I paid for the Recorder for 1926 and .89 for posting the place—paid for gasoline 1.35. at Potter's' in Cin. paid 3.20 for a pair of shoes to be sent. Sally called up Julia—who said Polly got home Wednesday. We left Cin. at 1.30. Very hot day—and night. It rained along the road.
- 19 We got to New York at 8.30. Frank met us. We went to 147 E. 36th St. and then down to Long Island [sic] getting here for lunch. Sally gave me a check for 26.25 int. It is a beautiful cool [day].
- 20 Sunday. Bright and windy all day. In the evening took a drive to the Club ground with Sally and Frank.
- 21 Bright after fog and warmer. Sent letters to Susie Tew, Susan and envelope as follows. I gave Frank 3 (three) checks of mine endorsed from Natl. Bk. of Wash. 132.00 Wash 28.00 and one for 30.00 and he gave me his check for 190.00 which I sent to Boone Co. Dep. Bk. to be put to my credit. He cashed checks for me and gave me 63.75. I paid Sally 17. she lent me at home. Went to Glencoe with Sally where these letters were mailed. Got letters from Sally C. and Lizzie H. Windy and turned cool.
- 22 Frank and Sally went to N. York. Partly sunny partly cloudy and cool, turned so much colder that Sally had a fire and it felt good. She got me stockings &c. I pd. 4.80. In the letter to Susan sent yesterday I enclosed a check for 10. To Harry not for his use but for him to be able to pay Dave for me.

- 23 Not so chilly as yesterday but cool. Sent letters to Dode Pope. Mr. McNeely about Bank Book and to Miss Annie Cason enclosing check for 14.00 on Cit. Dep. Bk. towards Beulah's board. Sally got telegram from Isabella. I got shoes from Potters to-day they cost 5.20.
- 24 Warmer and cloudy. Sally and Frank went to N. York for the day. Sally brought me letters from Julia F. Miss Shields, Lizzie H. and Laura D. Sally got me paper and shoe strings for which I paid 1.75. Sally got letter from Mrs. Parish.
- 25 Lovely day bright and cool. Got little note from John B. Tew and boxes of honey candy from Cousin Laura. Went with Sally and Frank to the Horse Show at Piping Rock. Saw Lucy Tew there.
- 26 Bright and colder. Got cream check 4.26. The Marys say the men told them there was frost last night. Sally and Frank went to the polo game. Sally got me Formamints—it cost .50. [tablets to protect against influenza & throat soreness.]
- 27 Sunday. Sally and Frank went to N. Y. to meet Bobby—started right after breakfast. Last night the Daylight saving stopped in N. York. Bobby came back with them—said Martha went on to college. It turned much warmer and the Katydids made a loud noise at night. Sally telephoned with Mrs. Parish.
- 28 Warm and bright doors open. All went to N. York and stayed till night. Mrs. Stettinius came and Mrs. Carrington and Hazel. I received a receipt from Mr. W. D. Cropper of the Boone Co. Dep. Bk. of Frank's note for \$190.00 (see 21st). Sally and I had a letter from Julia Loving.
- 29 Mild and pleasant. Lady Ronald Lindsay, Miss E. Hoyt came. Sally and Frank went to polo game. Bobby went with Miss De Forest to lunch and polo &c. I got my bank book from Cit. Dep. Bk. and have a balance in that Bank of 169.57.
- 30 Colder—gloomy and feels like snow. Sally F. and Bobby all went to N. Y. Bobby is going on to Yale. Fire feels good. Telegram came from Isabella saying they would be here to-morrow. Got letter from Miss Cason saying Beulah got there the evening of Sep. 23^d and from Susie Tew. Miss Cason Roxanna said she received the check see Sep. 23. Sally and Frank got home at dark, having left Bobby with his friends.

October

- 1 Bright and cold. There was frost last night. Sent by Frank letter to Harry enclosing cream check for 4.26 (see 26th) for him to use for me and a letter to Lizzie H. Got from Susie T. a pen of Sue's that she wishes me to sue. I intend to return it to her, and paper from Julia Foster. Isabella, Jack and Miss Seaborg arrived in N. Y. Frank met them and brought them down. Jack is very large lively and friendly—crawls like a terrapin and has some 'cute' little tricks—very sweet. Later Frank brought me B. F. Goodrich check 22.75 and and [sic] United Dyewood Corporation 52.50.
- 2 Cloudy and gloomy—sprinkled a little late. After lunch Lady Lindsay and Mrs. Olivia James came and Isabella went home with them. I sent a letter to Lily Grant. Sally got one from Sunny.
- 3 Rained hard last night and off and on this morning. I got a cream check 5.26. Sally went to N. York—she brought back Mrs. Fithian and John. Isabella came back with Lady Lindsay who stayed to lunch. She was sick the rest went to polo. Lorraine Warner came.
- 4 Sunday. Isabella sick but went to the Club to with the rest [sic]. Mrs. Col. Roosevelt came Lorraine came with Nickolas and the children. Then the James and de Forests.
The Christening
On Sunday September 13, 1925 John Selmes Greenway was christened by Rev. Dr. George Weld of Santa Barbara in the garden of 40 Mission Ridge Road. Sponsors Martha Munro Ferguson and William Irvine Greenway and Robert Munro Ferguson. Jack wore a dress made by Martha Macomb (Mrs. James Dinsmore). Jack will be a year old the 11 of October.

- 8 Beautiful morning, warm and bright, heavenly. Went with Sally to Glen Cove for the drive cool with wind. Sally and Frank lunched at Mrs. Pierce's.
- 9 Bad day—chilly rain all day. Sally and Frank went to N. Y. and got home after dark. I went with them to dine at Mrs. Stettinius's. It quit raining when we got home and blew a gale all night.
- 10 Blowing hard. Leaves and limbs fallen and still cloudy. Turned cold.
- 11 Sunday. Papers say yesterday was the coldest Oct. 10th in 55 years—wind 72 miles—5 killed in N. Y. and many hurt—flurry of snow. Thermometer 35°. Sally and Frank had a luncheon at the Club for the Pierce's and then Scotch friends Dondas [?]. They came home to this house and Mrs. Pierce to see me. The birthday of Jack Selmes Greenway. He is 1 year old. He had a birthday cake with one candle and his mother sent him a telegram, but he does n't know it. Lord love his sweet life.
- 12 Sally started for N. Y. but the motor was out of fix and she came back. I sent letters to Beulah and Susan. Got letter from Major Hector. This is called Columbus Day in N. Y. and is some sort of holiday. Not so cold. I got stamped envelopes 1.00.
- 13 Sally was gone all day to N. York, she got letter from Mrs. D. Robinson. Mild day.
- 14 Sent letter to Miss Mary Selmes. Got letter from Lily G. Poured down in the afternoon and at night. Bright morning. All stayed home.
- 15 Sun out again and mild and pleasant. I got letter from Susan. Did n't write any more in this till Sat. Think Miss S. and Jack and I went driving and later Sally and I went to Mrs. Guthrie's—no one at home.
- 16 Sally and Frank went to Bryn Mawr to see Martha and Isabella. Is. Said John had been very ill in Washington at Walter Reed Hospital with Dr. Keller. They did not come home till night—and it was raining—rained hard during the night. Almost like summer so warm.
- 17 Frank gave me, that came by mail, check for 10.00 from Natl. Metropolitan Bk. Wash. Rained a shower this morning and warm and cloudy. In the papers a notice that Helen Huntington's Robert is engaged to Miss Edith Taylor. Sally went to lunch at Mrs. Pierce's. Then I went to drive with her and after that to drive with Miss Seaborg and the baby. The woods are perfectly beautiful with autumn colors and the water as blue as the summer sky. Sally got letter from Mrs. Ballard and call[ed] her up at the Colony Club—Mr. Ballard better.
- 18 Sunday. Sally and Frank went to New Haven to Yale to see Bobby got home at night in time for dinner. Isabella called Frank up.
- 19 Got letter from Sliner Com. Co. at Stock Yards returns from 2 cows Harry sold.

- 21 Got note from Mrs. Milliken inclosing Frank's check for 106.25 int. on my T. Colder and partly cloudy. Sally and Frank went to N. Y.
- 22 Horrid day raining windy and cold. Sent letter to Lucy J. got one from Julia Foster. Harriet Jelke came to see us and Dinsmore Tew. Sally stayed at home Frank went to N. York.
- 23 They stayed home yesterday. Isabella came. The pictures of Jack and me and others of him came to-day—some very good. Isabella and John came. Bright off and on.
- 24 Sent by Frank envelope to C. E. McNeely inclosing check from Frank for int. endorsed for deposit. By mail letter to Beulah with 2.00 and one to Lily and to Susan. Horrid day. All went to N. York.
- 25 Sunday. The 3 letters did not get mailed till to-night. Horrid day—raining hard blowing a gale and cold. Last night Sally and Frank did n't get home till 9—they went to the dock to meet Mrs. Monroe. To-day Martha and Bobby came down with Isabella, they stayed till after lunch then went back to the Plaza—and took Jack and Miss Seaborg with them. Mr. Waldo McKee and his bride came to see Frank and Sally. It quit raining at night.
- 26 Bright. The papers have account of storm & hurricane. Sent letter to Julia F. Sally stayed home.
- 27 Mostly fair and cold and windy. Sally and Frank went to N. York. She brought my new dress. Sent letter to cousin Laura D.
- 28 Sally stayed home, packed. Eleanore telephoned. Cold and misted rain late. The cook and Mary Gleason left. Did n't write in this again till Nov. 7th.
- 29 Thursday. All got ready to leave Locust Valley and in the afternoon we went to New York. Mary Flinn went with us. Before leaving I got from the Cit. Dep. Bk. at home the certificates of Dep. of the checks I had sent. Also at different times Matheson brought me letters from Lily, Susan and Susie Tew, but I am not certain what days they came. It was rather cold and disagreeable.
- 30 Friday. A most horrid day. Snowed and blew and rained all day long. Sally Frank and I went to the Plaza Hotel to lunch with Isabella and John by former invitation and to see Jack and Miss Seaborg. Jack was the sweetest thing. Sally and Frank went to dine with Carl—they excused me on account of bad weather. Willie Tew was to have come to see me but we doubt the snow and bad day prevented. [sic]

- 1 In the morning snow on all the roofs and everywhere on the railroad remains of snow. We got to Chicago and stayed there from 3 to 8. Went to the Blackstone.
- 2 We got to Kansas City about 10 A.M.
- 3 We got to El Paso about 2.50 P.M.
- 4 We got the train at Los Angeles and came on. There was a little shower sometimes and we had a rainbow and a gorgeous sunset. We all got to Santa Barbara safe thank God, and arrived at Sally's house—found the house lighted up—clean as a new pin and Joe Ling with a hot supper waiting for us and the house looking all right from the earthquake. Wednesday evening.
- 5 Wrote to Susan sent Annie Myrtle 1.00. Sally telephoned Mrs. Oliver who came to see us. Stayed home—beautiful day.
- 6 I went with Sally driving about town to see the effects of the earthquake—busy repairing everywhere. Mrs. Fithian came. Lovely day.
- 7 Like spring, bright and beautiful. Got letter from Susan with Joe West's act. of work 18 days. She said it had snowed over and over all day 28th Oct. Frank gave me two checks—one Am. Light & Traction Co. 30.00. One Am. Gas & Electric Co. 37.50 both interest.

- 8 Sunday. Beautiful like spring. Sent letter to Susan inclosing check for Joe West for 36.00 on Cit. Dep. Bk. Went with Sally and Frank to Mrs. Colin Campbell's for Mrs. Fithian—and then to Mrs. F's for tea.
- 9 Lovely like spring. Went with Sally down to McDonald's riding school to get Frank. They had a telegram from Isabella. Sally had a letter from Beulah, sent from Bellevue here. I got absorbine jr. 1.00.
- 10 Lovely and mild. I got a letter from Flora sent letter to Flora and to Susie Tew. Took a drive on the mesa and by the ocean.
- 11 Armistice Day. Lovely like spring. Went to Miss Pete's to have my new skirt changed. Sent letter to Julia F.
- 12 Heavy fog. Sent letter to Lizzie H. Got letters from Lucy J. Julia F. and Cream check for 5.32. Frank's new Cadillac from Detroit came to-day. I took a little drive in it. Workmen began to make a porch and door to the little end room. I[t] began to blow hard this afternoon still blowing at night. I sent Miss Roxanne Cason check for 28.00 on Cit. Dep. Bk. for Beulah's board. Went to Miss Petey's.
- 14 Sent letter to Sally Chenault. Went with Sally to Mr. McDonald's for Frank—then to see Mrs. Oliver. Got note from Lizzie H. and Cream check of Nov. 3d for 5.32. Lovely like spring, saw crowds of gulls.
- 15 Sunday. Sally and I went to El Encanto and walked round. A lovely day. Sally and Frank went to lunch with Mrs. Fithian.
- 16 Spring like and fair. Went downtown with Sally—she got their invitation to Rob Huntington's wedding Nov. 28. Sally brought my skirts home.
- 17 Went with Sally down to McDonalds Riding School for Frank—stayed home after that.
- 18 Sally not so well had indigestion. She got letter from Ethel—later went driving. Mr. Prockter [sic] dined here. The filling came out of my tooth. Like summer.
- 19 Sally made an appointment for me with Dr. Allen for 11.30 Monday. Like summer. We went to Miss Petey's to take her my dress—then to the ocean. Like summer. Sally got my brooch from the jeweler. At about 10 P.M. the electricity was cut off by a fire below.
- 20 The fire continued—heavy smoke and ashes falling. I went with Sally to McDonald's to get Frank. Air hot and mountains hid by smoke.
- 21 Summer like. Mr. Duane and Mr. Phelps lunched here. Went with Sally and Frank to the Lobero Theatre to see Com. Arts Play Wappin' What. The fooliest more boresome thing I ever went to. Got an Invitation to Mary Waite's wedding and a cream check Nov. 10th—5.22.
- 22 Sunday. Warm as summer. Sally and Frank went to lunch at the Cates. Later Sally and I went to call on Mrs. Bissell. The fire still raged down below Carpenteria.
- 23 Warm and sprinkled now and then. Went to Dr. Allen and had a filling pu on a tooth—it was too much of a shell to hold gold and he put on a cement filling paid him 15.00. Got a letter from Lizzie H. and invitation from Mrs. Taylor to Pvt. Huntington's wedding Nov. Raining at night. Frank got telegram from Isabella.
- 24 Cleared up bright. Gave Frank my two checks (see 7th) 67.50 and he brought me a check for 20.00 and put the balance 47.50 in Bank to Sally's account. Sally washed by head. I stayed home. It rained a little.
- 25 Sent letter to Fanny Waite with check for 20.00 to the order of Mary R. Waite. Got a letter from Marion Resor Ammon. Went down town with Sally. Bought a package of stamped Env. and some postals .6 . Bought a blank book and little rubbers 1.60. Went to Miss Peterson's for Mrs. Hanson to try on my new dress. Beautiful day. Later after lunch sent letter to Harry with 3 Cream checks[s] two of them = 10.64 to be charged to Harry the third 5. I sent to him as a present to his mother who is very ill. Also sent a post card to the Postmistress at Petersburg asking her to send my letters to Santa Barbara.

- 26 Thanksgiving Day—gloomy and foggy. Stayed at home. Sally and Frank went to Mrs. Hoffmann's and heard that Mrs. Oliver is poorly—no mail.
- 27 Cloudy and foggy all day. Went with Sally to Mrs. Oliver's to ask about her—not so well, then went down town. After lunch went to Miss Petey's to try on my dress. Frank got telegram from Isabella in Ajo and Bess her cook trying to get another nurse for her. Christmas box came from Isabella for us. Mrs. Fithian came to dine.
- 28 Cooler and foggy—stayed home all day. Mrs. W. W. Cate and Miss Lockwood lunched here. Sally knew Mrs. Cate as a girl in St. Paul. Frank had telegrams from Isabella. I got a letter from Lily Grant and a card from Poetry.
- 29 Sunday. Gloomy and rather chilly. Mrs. Foster came to see Sally—she is going to Ajo to be nurse for Jack. Miss Esther Seaborg has come home from Ajo and after lunch we went out to see her and Missy Ryan. Miss S. is not well but saw us and told about Isabella and all. Stopped to ask about Mrs. Oliver—just the same her maid said. We met Mrs. Bacon.
- 30 Gloomy and disagreeable. Sent letter to Lily. Went down town with Sally. They went to the Deane school to hear Roy Chapman Andrews lecture about his trip to Mongolia. It sprinkled later.

December

- 1 Disagreeable day cloudy and chilly part of the time. About sundown it began to rain and rained after dark. I went down town with Sally and we went to see Mrs. Hazard and Miss Merrill. I sent a letter to Poetry Mag. Rained hard at and during night.
- 2 Bright and like spring. Rained 1.25 inch all together the paper says. Went with Sally to see the high lands and the Sheffield Dun_ that the earthquake ruined. After lunch we went to see the celebrated movie The Ten Commandments—one of the most boresome things I ever saw except the Egyptian part. Stopped to ask about Mrs. Oliver. They got telegrams from Isabella.
- 3 Bright and lovely, like spring. I went with Sally down town, sent letter to Amy.
- 4 Sally's birthday. Lord bless her sweet life. This book would n't hold it if I tried to put down the comfort she has been to me her life long. Went down town with her—bought paper &c. .60. Got letter from Susie Tew. Cut out of Sunday N. Y. Times account of R. D. Huntington's marriage to Miss Edith Taylor. Took a drive to the reservoir after lunch and called to ask about Mrs. Oliver. Beautiful day.

- 12 Bright and a little cooler. Went down with Sally. Sent to Ky. Tuberculosis Ass. a check for 5.00 on Boone Co. Dep. Bk. and returned the seas. Later got a letter from Beulah of the 5th she said it was cold and snowing. Got receipt of subscription from Poetry. Sally got letter from Martha.
- 13 Sunday and 14 I did n't write because I was in bed and my right wrist so stiff and swollen that I could not write.
- 15 Tuesday. Got up and was dressed and ate lunch at the table. Lovely bright day. Sent little note to Beulah inclosing 2.00 cash. Bk. for 24.20 to pay for 110 bus. coal Harry hauled for me. Went with Sally to see the Native Amateurs play A kiss for Cinderella at the Lobero. Much cooler, Frank got back after night.
- 20 Sunday. Cool and bright. We expect to start for Ajo to-morrow. Sally sent and got my skirt. Sent note to Petey.
